CYS MACBETH AUDITION INFORMATION

About the Project:

Audio drama provides an intimacy with the audience that invites a focus and attention to the language of Shakespeare that is truly exciting. That heightened listening will be possible due to sound and music design, a narrative voice to assist with sharing more of the who, what and where of the story, along with interspersed interviews with scholars (CYS Board Members) and you as a cast member. This production will provide a fresh context for understanding Shakespeare's classic as you share your personal opinions and thoughts about your characters, this story and its timeless themes.

Pay and Commitment:

Everyone participating in the cast will receive a courtesy honorarium of \$150.

The general expectations and commitment is as follows:

- Pre-Production Individual Text and Character Analysis Early October
- One Full Cast Table Read Wednesday, October 28 [evening]
- One session of work throughs for each scene TBA
- One recording session per scene, 1-2 takes TBA
- Various pick-ups and re-records as needed TBA

All of our rehearsals and recordings are virtual. For rehearsals and work- throughs we will utilize Zoom and for recordings we will use Source-Connect. A good and reliable internet connection and headphones are required. A microphone is appreciated but not required. We will record scenes with partners in Source Connect but in some cases we may need to you to record your lines individually and separately on an electronic device or your own.

Schedule

Rehearsals and recordings will take place at times which are mutually agreeable and fit your schedule but ideally be during the weekdays 10am-2pm CST and evenings 6pm-11 pm CST. We will make every effort to keep recording sessions under 90 minutes. Flexibility in scheduling is appreciated.

Casting

This production offers CYS another opportunity to work with veteran professionals and we are excited to be filling roles with actors that are interested in supporting and learning from CYS members while also sharing some of their expertise by example.

As you all know, CYS has always been committed to inclusive, color-conscious, and non-gender conforming casting on all fronts. Given the enormous significance of our present moment (and in asking ourselves, "Why this play now?), our hope is to actively increase representation for artists of color in the casting of this production.
