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

THE PLAY

Richard III is the final play in Shakespeare's tetralogy about the War of the Roses, a bloody power struggle for the English throne between the Houses of York and Lancaster that lasted over 30 years. Like many of Shakespeare's villains, (and other notorious tyrants throughout history), Richard is a master manipulator. He climbs his way to the top on a ladder of lies, deception, and murder — forsaking family, friends, God, and country in the process. With so much political intrigue, family drama, and backstabbing (both literal and metaphorical!) to keep track of, we have provided a handy "RIII Cheat Sheet" with a short timeline of events in the play, along with some characters to look out for.

RIII Cheat Sheet

- When the play begins, the House of York in power, King Edward IV sits on the throne, and the
 warring factions are at peace, at least for the moment. Richard, Duke of Gloucester, is not content,
 though. Determined to gain the crown from his brother Edward, Richard sets up his other brother,
 George, Duke of Clarence to be imprisoned for treason.
- Richard next moves to seduce Lady Anne, even though he killed her husband, (Prince Ned, son of Queen Margaret) and her father-in-law, (King Henry VI). Queen Margaret, who has technically been banished from England following Richard's murder of her husband King Henry VI, sees Richard's trechery and curses the nobles who still associate with him.
- King Edward orders his wife's Queen Elizabeth's family and his own family and friends to reconcile, and Richard plays the part, counterfeiting happiness at the reconciliation. However, he also delivers the news that their brother Clarence has been executed hastily by Edward's order (although the assassination was actually carried out by two murderers hired by Richard).
- Following Clarence's death, the sickly and guilt-ridden Edward dies, establishing Richard as Lord Protector over his two young sons until the older Prince is old enough to rule. This is much to the dismay of Edward's widow, Queen Elizabeth and her family members Rivers and Grey.
- With the help of his loyal side-kick, the **Duke of Buckingham**, Richard has his nephews (often referred to as the **Two Princes**) confined to the Tower of London, presumably for their safety.
- To further his plan, Richard orders the executions of Elizabeth's relatives, Rivers and Grey, along with Lord Hastings, a faithful friend of Richard's that he nevertheless distrusts. Meanwhile, Buckingham spreads rumors about the legitimacy of Edward's sons, implying they are not the true sons of King Edward, and ultimately persuades the Lord Mayor and the wary citizens of London that Richard should be king. While Richard, pretending to be a holy and pious man, originally denies the crown, he is "convinced" by Buckingham and accepts the role.
- Following his coronation, Richard continues to worry about the Earl of Richmond's growing
 popularity and claim to the throne. Richard spreads rumors that his wife Lady Anne is gravely ill, and
 orders Buckingham to oversee the execution of the young princes in the Tower. This is the last straw
 for Buckingham, who attempts to raise an army against Richard, but is ultimately captured and also
 killed.
- After Anne's death, Richard attempts to solidify his title by marrying his young niece, Elizabeth of York, (daughter of Edward IV and Queen Elizabeth). What he doesn't know is that Elizabeth has secretly promised her daughter to Henry, Earl of Richmond, in hopes that Richmond will ascend the throne and her daughter will be his Queen. Both Elizabeth and Richard's mother, the **Duchess of** York, curse Richard and pray for his demise, inspired by the curses of Queen Margaret.
- Richmond's forces advance and the two armies meet at Bosworth. Richard is joined by loyal followers Stanley, Ratcliff, and Norfolk. The night before the battle Richard is haunted by the ghosts of his victims, who promise his defeat and Richmond's victory. Richard dies in battle and Richmond is named King Henry VII of England. The play ends with Henry's announcement that he will marry Elizabeth of York, uniting the Houses of Lancaster and York once and for all.
