Some questions to think about...

- 1. Why do this play today? Why is this story important to tell again?
- 2. Do the issues of this play still resonate today? Are there still parents who mandate who their children hang out with? Do people still kill each other because they are from rival groups? Where else do you see connections?
- 3. What role do you think **time** plays in this tragedy? How many times do you hear "time" or "hour" mentioned?
- 4. How do movement and gesture impact our telling of this story? Are there any other words or ideas that you would have added gesture to?

- 5. Think about the role of the Chorus. Who do you think they were? Why were they there?
- 6. Did casting a girl in the role of Romeo change the story for you? How?
- 7. Why is it important to keep Shakespeare's works alive? What can we learn from him 400 years later?

What is CYSE??

The Chicago Youth Shakespeare Ensemble program is open to high school students from all over the Chicago area. They audition to get in and then spend about 10 weeks training, rehearsing, and collaborating to create a Shakespeare production that is all their own. (FYI: CYS also has summer program. Check our website or join our mailing list for 2015 audition dates.)

What does the Youth Ensemble do in rehearsals?

We play ensemble games, we work with the text of the play and getting it on its feet, and we train. We especially rely on elements of these three acting techniques:

Suzuki - training originally from Japan centered around body control.

The Viewpoints - improvisational movement that is broken down into elements of time and space. If you like the movement and gesture in R+J you will probably like The Viewpoints.

Meisner - a technique that is all about listening, observing, reacting honestly, and taking it personally.

What's different about this Romeo and Juliet?

When we started the process our first question was: how can we understand and relate to this famous story right now? This conversation lead us to the decision of casting a girl in the role of Romeo and creating additional, original text to frame the play. CYSE students worked with playwright, Danielle Littman to create this original text around the themes of disconnect, love, rebellion, and what it means to be a teenager. We also got excited about the way movement and gesture could help us tell this story, so we brought in actor and teaching artist, Kelley Abell to help!
