

About the Ensemble (& our process)

The Chicago Youth Shakespeare Ensemble (CYSE) Summer Intensive is a need-blind program open to high school students across the Chicagoland area. Representing a diverse range of communities and life experiences, CYSE students create a unique, artistic ensemble fueled by collaboration, innovation, and creative discovery.

Five weeks ago, we presented our summer ensemble students with two questions: "What are the issues affecting your world (and ours) that you want to speak up about?" And, "How can we use Shakespeare to do just that?" The ensemble then launched their creative process by crafting a question of their own: "How does identity influence what power is and who gets it?" Devised by CYS summer students, and featuring excerpts from more than 15 different Shakepseare plays, *Uneasy Lies The Head* gives a new voice to the timeless issues of power, identity, and privilege.
